Notes from the Historic Environment Action Plan Meeting

Thursday 11th June 2009 at 2 pm held at 29 Queen Square Bristol, BS1 4ND

Purpose of the Meeting

- The Cranborne Chase and West Wiltshire Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) covers 981 square kilometers of rural Dorset, Hampshire, Somerset and Wiltshire. It covers parts of 9 different local & unitary authorities. See <u>www.ccwwdaonb.org.uk</u>
- The AONB has embarked on a two year project funded by English Heritage to create Historic Environment Action Plans for the AONB, running from February 2009 to January 2011. See <u>www.historiclandscape.co.uk</u>
- This meeting was hosted by the South West regional team of English Heritage to ensure that all local authorities are aware of the project, and are provided with an opportunity to feed into it. The meeting also aimed to look at ways the HEAP Project could inform the work that Local Authorities are already doing.
- The meeting also provided Local Authority officers to network with colleagues in adjacent authorities and counties.

1. Welcome and introduction to Historic Environment Action Plans

Shane Gould, English Heritage opened the meeting and welcomed everyone.

Peter Herring of English Heritage outlined the background to Historic Environment Action Plans.

- They were first discussed in reference to the Historic Environment Countryside Advisors and their work with Agri-environment Schemes. It was noted that their environmental colleagues were at an advantage due to the presence of Biodiversity Action Plans nested from a national level which provided them with a framework within which to act and provide advice. It was felt that an equivalent framework for the Historic Environment would be advantageous.
- Thinking around Historic Environment Action Plans evolved alongside the development of the practical applications of the new tool of Historic Landscape Characterisation, and the concept and possible structure of Historic Environment Action Plans was first introduced in the 2004 publication 'Using Historic Landscape Characterisation'.
- Since then a pilot project creating Historic Environment Action Plans has been undertaken on the Isle of Wight. This was adopted as SPG and feed into the AONB Management Plan. The Isle of Wight project alongside the new project for the Cranborne Chase and West Wiltshire Downs AONB will be used as a basis for English Heritage to produce national guidance on Historic Environment Action Plans.

2. Brief Introduction to CCWWD AONB and the HEAPs projects

Emma Rouse, Historic Environment Action Plan Project Officer, Cranborne Chase and West Wiltshire Downs AONB outlined details of the new project. The handout provided is attached as Appendix 1

- The Historic Environment Action Plan (HEAP) Project is a two year initiative funded by English Heritage running from February 2009 to January 2011.
- The primary aim of the project is the creation of a best practice model for the creation of Historic Environment Action Plans (HEAPs) within protected landscapes.
- The creation of HEAPs will facilitate the proactive and effective management of the historic and archaeological aspects of the AONB from a landscape perspective.
- Proposed actions can be adopted not just by the AONB team but by all the other members of the AONB partnership, and by anybody with an interest in the project area.
- Where appropriate, the proposed actions will be linked to the planning system or other established formal management structures and processes.
- Inputs into the HEAP include data from the AONB Historic Landscape Characterisation, HER records, Heritage Designations, Heritage at Risk, Portable Antiquity Scheme, Research and Projects, CAAs, Parish Plans.
- HEAPs will be created for:
 - Historic Environment Landscape Character Areas covering the whole AONB

- Crosscutting themes e.g. routes and trackways or military archaeology Outputs would include:
 - A small number of SMART actions for the Historic Environment of the AONB with clearly identified timescales and funding mechanisms.
 - Statements linking existing projects and initiatives including practical links into planning system and community strategies etc. Engaging with strategic planning and land management in particular.
 - A series of methodological statements targeted especially at other protected landscapes
- The Steering Group is a key element for consultation and aims to have a wide cross section of individuals and organisations with an interest in the Historic Environment and the AONB. It is envisaged that this group will go on to oversee the HEAP when they are completed.

ACTION ARISING \Rightarrow Local Authority representatives to look at steering group list (attached as Appendix 2) and suggest other individuals who would have an interest in the project.

ACTION ARISING \Rightarrow Agri-environment schemes (in particular HLS) were identified as a key mechanism with which the HEAPs should engage. Especially providing clear targeting areas and engaging with joint character targeting statements. ER to have meeting with Roger Griffin, Natural England to discuss this.

ACTION ARISING \Rightarrow Contact needs to be made with Inspector of Ancient Monuments Hampshire (EH to provide contact)

ACTION ARISING \Rightarrow Possibility of using Heritage Estates as key land management contacts, EH to investigate.

ACTION ARISING \Rightarrow ER to make contact with County Conservation Officers group – Vanessa to provide contact for Wiltshire

3. Initial feedback from the Historic Environment Sector

In order that Historic Environment Action Plans are of relevance to the work of Local Authorities participants were asked to provide an overview of current priorities, programmes, aims, or strategies.
